# Deliver Us from the Evil One

As followers of Christ, we are all familiar with how our Lord has taught us to pray. "After this manner therefore pray ye" He says, before explaining that we are to address God as "Our Father," give Him praise and then make six requests (Matthew 6:9-13). Given such a short list of requests, they are clearly the most important things about which we should pray. Yet it is easy for us to overlook the significance of — or even to understand — the sixth request, "deliver us from evil." In our material- and technology-focused culture, we can become blind to the spiritual realities at work in our lives. Two such realities evident in the Lord's Prayer are our dependence upon God for provision ("give us this day our daily bread") and our need for His protection ("deliver us from evil").

As we pray for deliverance from evil, we must ensure that we have adopted the Bible's — and not our culture's — view of evil. The truth about evil, revealed in God's Holy Word, is that it is personal. Evil is not a vague spiritual force, and it is not the result of chance, as in some notion of "bad luck." Our enemy, the devil, is a fallen angel, a spirit creature of our Creator who leads others of his kind. We ultimately experience evil because these fallen spirits are dedicated to destroying God's creation and opposing His plans. We pray and work to see "Your kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven," and evil spirits work to see humans destroy themselves by choosing to build their own kingdoms and manifest the desires of their own wills.

In this month's magazine, you will read about Christians in Benin, the field within VOM's work in which spiritism — the worship of spirits — is practiced most overtly. Practitioners of voodoo and other forms of tribal spiritism intentionally become demonically possessed and offer sacrifices to spirits they know to be evil. One sacrifice routinely offered in Benin's villages is the virginity of young girls, who are offered to demonic spirits through ritualistic rape by male spiritist practitioners. The girls' parents willingly offer them for sacrifice.

Please remember that those who — whether around us or around the world — live apart from the way, the truth and the life are captives to our spiritual enemy. But also remember that he is a defeated enemy. The fallen angels, including their chief, are not a power that can oppose God. Like their peers, Michael and God's other holy angels, they may be mighty but they are not almighty. God has judged and defeated the evil spirits, and they know that their destiny is "the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels" (Matthew 25:41). Christ is victorious! Our persecuted Christian family members in Benin are showing us how to obey God by loving the lost and bravely taking back that which the enemy has stolen.





he Good News was spreading," Amadine said, recalling the Gospel advances that were occurring in the early days of her marriage two decades earlier. Every day, preachers in the West African country of Benin were teaching from God's Word, actively and publicly proclaiming the peace and salvation found in Jesus Christ. After listening to the preachers, Amadine became convinced of the truth of Scripture.

"Please, my husband, let's try to follow Jesus," she pleaded with her husband, Bernard. But she had little hope that he would agree. Bernard, like many in Benin, practiced voodoo, and he was a leader among the voodooists in their community.

Benin is considered the birthplace of voodoo. Every village and many homes in the north have a designated leasting for the ritualistic.

location for the ritualistic killing of animals (and sometimes humans), a practice believed to win favour with or appease the wrath of demonic spirits.

Witchcraft is also deeply ingrained in the culture and is practiced openly. Conversely, Christianity is considered a foreign religion that steals a community's young people and prevents them from being properly initiated into the local tribes. Amadine described Bernard's version of voodoo as "very wicked."

"If he met you in the night when he was conducting rituals, he would kill you," she said. Bernard warned his young wife that he would kick her out of the house if she continued listening to the Christian preachers and following Christ. And he was true to his word.

Every time Amadine attended a church service, Bernard locked her out of the house, a punishment that continued even after they had children. When Amadine took the children to church, Bernard made them all sleep outside and go without food. As the children grew older and began following Christ themselves, Bernard increased the pressure on his family, refusing to pay school fees and ultimately withdrawing the children from school altogether.

Amadine persevered for 20 years, faithfully attending church despite the price she paid at home. To compensate for the lack of support she and the children received from Bernard, Amadine worked as a hairdresser and sold food she had made.

Then, one day in 2023, Bernard's abuse reached a new level. He beat Amadine so severely that neighbours who had never before attempted to stop his mistreatment took action to physically restrain him. He broke the few possessions that Amadine had and threw her out of the house.

"All my face was broken," Amadine said. "When he did that, I just went away with the children." She rented a small house, where she and the children finally had a place to sleep every night. Soon, however, she got some surprising news from her pastor.

"Please come back to your house," the pastor told her. "He has decided to follow Jesus!"

Amadine couldn't say what had caused her husband's change of heart, but she could see that it was real. She learned that he had simply refused to join some other voodooists who came to take him to the rituals one night. "I am no longer with you," he told them. "I am now with Jesus."

The voodooists tried to convince him that he could be a Christian and still perform the rituals of voodooism, but he stood his ground. From that time, when the church was open for prayer or worship, Bernard was there. Amadine and the children returned home to live with Bernard, but their time together as a Christian family did not last long.

About two months after Bernard came to faith in Christ, his former friends — the voodooists — offered

him a job making bricks for a construction project. Bernard took the job and went to work with his former friends. Later, after returning

from the worksite, Bernard began to complain of severe stomach pain. Amadine took him to a hospital, but he soon died; Amadine believes he was poisoned by the men at the worksite.

Bernard's family added to Amadine's grief by threatening to take the family's property. "They said I was the cause of his death because I was the one who took him to the church," Amadine explained. The family demanded that she return to voodooism and marry one of Bernard's brothers, but she rejected both demands and moved out of the home where she and Bernard had lived.

Since September 2023, Amadine has relied on support from her local church and the global body of Christ. But despite her difficult circumstances, she has kept her eyes fixed on lesus.

"I have one certainty," Amadine said, "and that is that I put my trust in the one who never fails. He will never abandon me."

Amadine requests prayer for her children as they continue school and for herself as she tries to establish a business to help support her family. As she waits for answers to those prayers, she sings with joy about the God who rescued her from darkness 20 years ago.

"I thank you, my God," Amadine sang in a strong alto voice. "You really are the one who holds us till the end of life. I want to do all I can to tell the whole earth that You are the only God." ■

# Forsaking His FATHER'S IDOLS

n the day Mattias Sossou was baptized two years ago, his life changed dramatically. But not in ways he had imagined.

After walking home from his baptismal service, Mattias was greeted by a group of people standing in front of his home. "They were going to tie me up and beat me," he said.

Their reason for planning to attack Mattias was common knowledge in the community. As the oldest child in his family, Mattias was expected to care for his father's voodoo idols when his father died. But 19-year-old Mattias had become a follower of Christ, forsaking the rituals and responsibilities of voodooism.

Voodooists in Mattias's community believe the idols' spirits take revenge on anyone who defies them, sometimes attacking the person's wider circle of family and friends, so rejecting voodoo is unacceptable. Knowing what the voodooists might do to him, Mattias chose to run.

### **Turning from Fear**

Mattias had grown up performing ritualistic animal slaughter to receive favour with demonic spirits, but a Christian classmate gradually changed Mattias's spiritual perspective. After the friend described what it was like to have Christ in his life, Mattias was intrigued. Still, when the friend invited him to church, Mattias felt he had to explain the potential repercussions of offending the spirits his father had worked to appease.

His friend's response surprised him. "Don't be afraid of your forefathers or your father," the friend said. "Don't be afraid of anyone, because the one who is calling you is greater than them, and he can save you from anything. The person who is calling you, his name is Jesus."

Mattias agreed to visit the church, so his friend came to his house so they could walk together. When Mattias returned home, however, his father told him that if his classmate came to the house again there would be trouble. Mattias warned his friend, who agreed not to come to the house but urged Mattias to keep attending church services. "No matter what is going on," his friend said, "don't

leave the church."

Mattias continued to attend church, receiving frequent warnings from local voodoo elders who tried to persuade him that what he was doing was wrong. Undeterred, Mattias eventually came to faith in Christ and received baptism.

Mattias considered it a great day, both because of its spiritual significance and because he believed God had saved him from an awaiting trap. "I really sensed that Jesus loves me so much," he said.

### On the Run

When he saw the group of men lying in wait for him, Mattias ran directly to his classmate's house and hid inside. They came to the house looking for him, but his friend persuaded them to look elsewhere.

The next day when Mattias returned home, his father ordered him to leave. "Pack your things and go where you want to go," he said, "because we are not the same." Rejected by his father, Mattias left home, eventually moving in with an aunt who lived in a distant village.

After discovering where Mattias was living, his father threatened the aunt who was helping him. She, in turn, pleaded with Mattias to leave the church. "Your parents want to abandon you!" she told him. "If your parents abandon you, who is going to take care of you?"

Mattias told his aunt that he would never leave Christ or his church family. "On the last day of my life," he said, "God will ask me, 'Is it because of your parents that you left the church?' What am I going to tell God?" Seeing that Mattias could not be persuaded, his aunt kicked him out of her home too.

With no place else to go, Mattias walked back to his village carrying a bag with all his possessions. Someone who recognized him asked, "Why do you come back to the village? Are you going to leave the church? Are you going to start with voodoo?"

He assured the person that he wasn't leaving the church, and then he went to his family's home, where he expected to again be pressured to recant. As he waited in a room, someone locked the door so he couldn't leave.

Several hours later, a younger sister unlocked the door and Mattias escaped. He ran until he was far from the village, and eventually he was invited to move in with a pastor's family. He has lived with them ever since.

Mattias is grateful that the pastor, whom he didn't know previously, accepted him into his home, and he's also thankful for Christians who have been providing for his needs. "No matter how my family abandoned me, I have a great family that is more than my family," he said.

### **Praying for His Parents**


Today, Mattias is an active member of his new spiritual family. He plays in a worship band, teaches a children's Sunday school class and participates in a prayer group. He would like to support himself by becoming a barber, and he dreams of one day returning to his village and telling those who rejected him about Jesus Christ.

Knowing that his parents can't imagine a world outside voodoo, he requests prayer that their hearts will soften to the Gospel. But approaching them now, he says, is probably too soon. "They wouldn't like it," he said. "They would laugh at me. If they had a gun they would shoot me."

Regardless of what his parents think of him, Mattias is committed to the life he has in the body of Christ. "What made me to have courage," he said, "is that in the Bible Jesus himself says, 'I will not abandon you."
